


Tolland High School Senior and Avon High School Field Hockey Team Named 2026 Michael H. Savage Spirit of Sport Award Honorees

Cam Soucy Tolland High School Senior



Cam Soucy, a Tolland high school senior and boys soccer co-captain, and the Avon High School field hockey team are both recipients of the 2026 Michael H. Savage Spirit of Sport Award. Soucy and Avon Field Hockey become the 17th and 18th recipients of the distinguished yearly award. The Michael H. Savage Spirit of Sport Award seeks to recognize individuals who exemplify the ideals of the positive spirit of sport that represent the core mission of education-based athletics. The award may be given in recognition of a specific act or an activity of longer duration. This is the first time in the award's history that multiple honorees will be recognized in the same year.





Cam Soucy, who along with his Tolland High teammates won a second consecutive CIAC Class M Boys Soccer State Championship in the fall of 2025, is a pediatric cancer survivor and inspiration to those who know his story. In 2013, just before his fifth birthday, he was diagnosed with Stage 4 neuroblastoma with metastasis. Neuroblastoma is a cancer of the nervous system. Cam's tumor was on his adrenal gland and at time of diagnosis the cancer had metastasized throughout his body. The prognosis was bleak. Cam's mother Jessica Soucy shares that on a neuroblastoma rating scale of zero to 30, "Zero indicating being cancer free and 30 being end of life care, Camden was a 28 at diagnosis."

Receiving treatment in both Hartford and Boston, Soucy had surgery to remove the tumor, underwent chemotherapy, antibody therapy, and radiation therapy, underwent a bone marrow transplant and needed two years of a maintenance drug to keep him cancer free. Tolland Head Boys Soccer Coach Michael Caccamo says, "To be able to look at Cam and call him our captain, and call him our leader, and to call him a state champion, I think it means the world."

Longtime Avon field hockey head coach Terri Ziemnicki notes what a difference Kaylie's inclusion in the program has made, "I think back if she had never played field hockey, what would have been the opportunity where it just clicked? It's magical." Kaylie came to have "40 sisters" on the team, and Avon Field Hockey sent a message across Connecticut, and beyond, that inclusion can be a hallmark for measuring impact and success in education-based high school athletics.
